Remodels of the ramp entrance, front steps, elevator, I enjoy the model of St Paul in the Entrance Years of admiring the stained-glass windows, the stories they told and letting my imagination go Large Christmas trees The beautiful decorations for holidays. Coffee talk. I often tell people that "I was raised in a church basement". Many of my friends understand immediately what I mean by that.

The absolute BEAUTY of the church building, Inside and outside. I was always proud of my church in Springfield and even invited my minister in Rochester to stop and look at it, which he did. I sought a church like it in Austin and Round Rock, Texas, and Rochester Mn. I have never found a church with the beauty of St Paul's. But more than that, I have never felt as loved and supported by any church more than St Paul's. This congregation has followed me thru college, dating, marriage, motherhood and the loss of my parents and loved ones. It reminds me of the song: "I am the church. - •Release-Time each week at St. Johns Lutheran Church
- •Luther League in the parsonage basement with JoAnne Wendt as the advisor.
- •Luther League at Curt and Georganne Danielson's house across from the church. We met every Wednesday night and then all walked across the street for Senior Choir rehearsal.
- •Attending the Luther League Youth Gathering in Kansas City with Don and Vicki Russell as our advisor chaperones.
- •Serving Luther League chili suppers and Luther League car washes.
- •The Luther League cleaning the church (all but the sanctuary) when we were without a janitor.
- •Filling in for a week in the church office for Delores Wilson—trouble printing the bulletin. VerJean Luense from St. Johns Church coming over to help me do the printing on the mimeograph machine.
- •Hearing the new, refurbished pipe organ for the first time at Carol Kettner's funeral in 1974.
- •The big service and dedication of the organ with Dr. Gully in 1974. The church was full of people who attended the recital and dedication.
- Lay Witness Mission weekend in the late 1970s.
- •Driving home in a blizzard from a Confirmation outing to the Twin Cities. Bob Kettner was driving the car I was in—everyone made it back to Springfield.
- •Ed Meidl and I cooking all the sauerkraut and transporting it to the Park for Riverside Days Kids Against Hunger benefit supper during Riverside Days.
- •Rally Sundays in Brown's Park and Riverside Park.
- Christmas Eve at church. Always big crowd for the Sunday School Christmas program. And the church was always decorated so beautifully. I remember there was always a big live Christmas tree that stood in the choir loft. Bob Johnston always directed the Christmas programs.

I remember coming to church at St. Paul's with my friend Krista Voge when we were about 12-14 years old. I used to beg my mom to join here because I loved the building and especially the red carpet! And that they gave out the wine in little cups!

Krista used to invite me to the Lock-Ins! I remember playing hide and seek in the dark church, the older kids would constantly try to scare us. One time we snuck up to the balcony and had a paper airplane contest in the dark to see whose plane would go the furthest. When the chaperones came looking for us we hid under the pews.

When we were finally ready to "sleep" we slept in the little coat room in the narthex under the stairs!

When I was in high school, a group of friends and I filmed a music video at St. Paul's for a school project. The song was "How Do you Talk to an Angel" by The Heights.

Kathy Pederson was the one who invited John and I to St. Paul's when we were on the search for a new church to join. Little did I know that 6 years later I would begin working here. I am grateful for being called to work at St. Paul's for the past 8 years and for the friends that my family has made along the way!

Some of my greatest memories of St. Paul's since being a member have been Wyatt being baptized here, singing in the church choir, playing my trumpet for holidays, bowling parties, serving meals, learning and talking about the church's history with visitors, and most recently Noah's Confirmation. Growing up, St. Paul felt like a second home to me. I enjoyed visiting with Gene and Donna Arndt at coffee talk and Rita Tessien's annual performance of "The Old Rugged Cross." I remember when the "Senior" choir wore robes and sat together up front after marching into the sanctuary, singing the opening hymn. Following the service, they would march out during the closing hymn, and sing from behind the congregation to close out the service. As a small child, I would go with my parents to choir practice and spend the entire time sliding on my stomach under the pews from the back to the front. MEMORIES OF MY HOME CONGREGATION

Tom von Fischer July 21, 2022

Greetings to all who have gathered on this historic occasion. I had hoped to be with you in person, but our long-planned and awaited family vacation, including our two children, spouses and four grandchildren, began yesterday in northern Wisconsin.

Paul Muske has encouraged me to share some of my memories in writing.

The Bigger Picture

It's impossible for me to share "my memories" without acknowledging the von Fischer family of which I am proudly a part. A few stories:

- My grandpa William was called to be pastor of *St. Paulus Evangelische Lutherische Kirche* (only German-speaking) in 1914, just as World War I was breaking out. He came from St. Paul, MN, where he was serving both as pastor of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church and as district president (now called bishop). In the latter role, he was a member of the Board of *St. Johannes Lutherisches Hospital*) in Springfield. His call to St. Paul's included the responsibility to serve as the superintendent at St. John's.
- Over the next 85 years from 1914-1999, 34 members of our extended von Fischer family spanning four generations would call Springfield 'home' for at least a portion of their lives. (pp. 241-248, Remembering Who We Are.) This means that our family journeyed with this congregation during more than half of its 150 Years Walking with God. With the death of Margaret Ann (Marge) Weber in 1999, the residency of our family in Springfield came to a close.
- Other key family members who were community leaders include:
 - My father Rev. Max, who joined my grandpa as assistant pastor in 1927. In 1952, after losing his vision from detached retinas, Grandpa resigned and Dad took the reigns of leadership at both the church and hospital.
 - I have many childhood memories of tagging along with Dad when he would go to St. John's. A favorite was being the 'gopher' for the maintenance man Hans Wilsterman (St. Paul's member), running the tunnels back and forth to his workshop for tools to help him fix stuff.
 - My uncles Phil and Fred von Fischer owned and operated von Fischer Brothers Rexall Drug Store (the current location of Springfield Floral Shop) in 1924, which they operated for 47 years until 1971.
 - I was one of 14 members of our family who worked at the Drug Store during our high school and college years. We often said: "Everything we needed to know about life we learned by working at the Drug Store." Uncle Phil and Uncle Fred were great teachers, mentors and bosses (pp. 38-40).

- Uncle Phil was a member of the School Board for 37 years, serving as chair for most of those years. When he handed me my diploma as valedictorian of the Class of 1961, I'm not sure who was more proud!
- o My cousin William (Phil and Vera's oldest child) was remarkable in many ways. Confined to a wheel chair for most of his life with muscular atrophy, William was not only the bookkeeper for the Drug Store, but also financial secretary (contribution record keeper) for St. Paul's for 48 years (1941-1989) (p. 245). If you do the math, that means St. Paul's was served by von Fischer leaders for 75 years, from 1914-1989.
 - William was one of my favorite cousins, as we spent countless hours together. I was his assistant as he embossed names on napkins for confirmations and weddings. He wanted to know all the details about my week at Bible Camp or Luther League trip. And I'll never forget his first trip to our house on his own after getting his first power wheel chair. What a great day that was for all of us!
- o I'll conclude this section with a couple memories of my mother, Pauline. So many roles she played in my life!
 - She was my Sunday School teacher. Before the Education Building was built, one year she taught our class in the basement of the parsonage, next to the coal-burning furnace.
 - She sat on the piano bench next to me for endless hours, making sure I played every note correctly. When I became the assistant organist for day funerals when Mr. Coates (our organist and music teacher at school) couldn't get off work, I said thank you to mother for having been such a strict task-master, making music a joy for me.
 - Mother was my German teacher for two years at SHS, which gave me the skills to speak, read and write in the von Fischer 'mother tongue.' (Yes, that was part of the original plan for the 150th anniversary, to have me preach in German!)
 - Mother taught me the love of gardening, which I've shared with each church I've served as pastor, at each of the homes where we lived, including our current home at Folkestone, a senior community in greater Minneapolis.

Some Memorable Moments Over the Years

- As a young child (only child!) in the parsonage ...
 - Folding Sunday worship bulletins every Saturday night after Mom ran them off on the mimeograph. ("Be sure to fold them straight!")
 - Using a scissor to help my mother cut the Christmas memory pieces she had typed for each of us Sunday School students, which we had to memorize and recite on Christmas Eve.
 - Helping Dad water plants at the family graves at the cemetery, asking lots of questions about all the members of church who were buried there.

- Singing in the Children's Choir with Doc Tessien, my very first choir experience. (70 years and 16 choirs later, I'm still singing, thanks to my early training and experience at St. Paul's!)
- Having church leaders from all over the world visit St. Paul and stay overnight with us in the parsonage. As the only child, I was permitted to "listen in" to almost all of those fascinating conversations. I learned a lot!

As a teen-ager ...

- Confirmation and first communion, including the public examination in front of the entire congregation, with my Dad giving me the toughest question to answer. (He knew that I had everything memorized, so neither of us were worried!)
- Going to American Lutheran Memorial Bible Camp (now Camp Onomia) near Onamia every summer.
- Taking a charter train with 900 Luther Leaguers from southern Minnesota to the National Luther League Convention in Miami Beach in the summer of 1961. One of the speakers who inspired us was Martin Luther King, Jr.
- Since my cousin Chuck (Fred and Martha's son), who was three years older than I, went to St. Olaf and got to sing in the St. Olaf Choir, I followed in his footsteps and enjoyed 4 wonderful years there, working at the Drug Store each summer to help pay my expenses.

As an adult ...

- o Got married to Becky Helgesen on July 20, 1968 at Minnetonka Lutheran Church in the Twin Cities. A van load of folks from St. Paul's came for the occasion, but because of a flat tire enroute, they arrived a few minutes late. Fortunately, the bride was also a few minutes late getting ready, so the van arrived 'just in time' for the procession.
- Exactly one year to the day later, July 20, 1969, was my ordination day at St. Paul's. So many people at church had encouraged and supported me in my sense of call, the third-generation pastor (along with Chuck, 3 years earlier) from our von Fischer family. After the reception, we walked across the street to our home, turned on the TV and listened to these words from Neil Armstrong: "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind."
- o During my years (1984-1995) as pastor of Zion Lutheran Church in south Chicago (a middle-class, African-American congregation), we formed a Mission Partner relationship between St. Paul and Zion, in which every other year a bus or van-load of people would travel from Chicago to Springfield or vice-versa to spend a weekend sharing our lives and ministries with each other. Some long-term relationships developed that continue to this day.

Pastor August Kenter 1870 - ?

St. Paul's Ev. Lutheran Church at Springfield, Minnesota, was organized by Pastor August Kenter. The first entry in the first church record book reads:

"Church book of St. Paul's congregation in Leavenworth, Brown County, Minnesota, founded on the Confessions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church Anno D. 1870 by Pastor August Kenter. Founded in the year 1870 and organized on October 10, 1870."

Rev. Kenter resided on his own farm about ten miles west of Springfield. He organized and served several other congregations and mission stations. The records do not reveal any information concerning the time when his services with our congregation were terminated. It is known that Pastor Meyer and Pastor Verting from New Ulm and Sleepy Eye were supply pastors during the time our congregation was without a pastor.

In the summer of 1878 Pastor G, Kittel accepted a call to the congregation. During the term of his ministry the young congregation experienced some troublesome times. Strife, contentions and misunderstandings caused factions and frictions. As a result the membership of the congregation declined from thirty to thirteen.


Undaunted by the number thirteen, the faithful members under the leadership of Pastor Kittel worked zealously. The first church building was erected and paid for by these few members, among them several widows.

In November 1881 Pastor Kittel's ministry with our congregation ended when he followed a call to near Albert Lea, Minnesota.

A few of our older members today have fond memories of Pastor Kittel and his labors among them.

Pastor G. Kittel 1878 - 1881

FIRST CHURCH BUILDING

In the fall of 1878 the above pictured first building was erected. Its size was 24x40 feet. It served a three-fold purpose: church, school house and parsonage. In those years this community experienced its most difficult times. For four consecutive years a grasshopper plague destroyed all crops and thereupon followed two years of draught. Many immigrants, convinced that this section of Minnesota would never yield a livelihood, moved to greener fields. The thirteen members who remained had faith in the fertility of the soil here and faith in God's goodness. The entire cost of the building, \$1200.00, was paid out of their meager income.

It has not been possible to learn who these staunch and faithful thirteen members were, else their names would be recorded here. On our seventy-fifth anniversary we salute these heroes in grateful memory.

Pastor Dietrich Lange was the next regularly called minister of the congregation. He was born and educated in Hermannsburg, Germany and had emigrated to the United States shortly before coming here.

Pastor Lange was a deeply spiritual and devout shepherd of souls. Under his guidance the congregation became well grounded in the principle teachings of Holy Scriptures as expressed in the Confessions of the Ev. Lutheran Church. The congregation was affiliated with the Minnesota Synod. Because of the doctrine of predestination, as it was taught at the time by the Missouri Synod, and the Minnesota Synod concurring with the former Synod in this doctrine, Pastor Lange severed his affiliation with the Minnesota Synod and joined the Ohio Synod. Without a single exception the entire membership of our congregation followed its pastor in this action. God blessed Pastor Lange's labors significantly so that the congregation grew spiritually stead-fast and numerically strong.

permitted to labor many years in the vineyard of the Lord. On February 22, 1889
God called His servant unto Himself. His body lies buried in our church cemetery.

Second Church Building

The rapidly growing congregation outgrew the limited space in its first house of God. The second, larger and more appealing in appearance church building was erected in 1887 and dedicated on Palm Sunday 1888. In those days this building was a source of joy to the members and a cause of pride for the village of Springfield.

It was built by the contractors John Lau and E. Glock. The building committee consisted of A. Engel, secretary, Carl Kettner, Wm. Langhoff, treasurer, Carl Pautzke, August Sandmann, Lebrecht Schulz, Carl Wendt and Wm. Wendt.

For thirty-six years this building was the place of worship for large numbers. Memories never to be forgotten still linger in the minds of many members today which they associate with their large frame structure church building.

During the illness and following the death of Pastor D. Lange the congregation was

served by Schlueter and Groschupf, candidates of theology from Luther Seminary, St. Paul, Minnesota.

Pastor J. Geo. Appel, who had served as vicar to Pastor D. Lange while he was

pastor of the churches in and near Lamberton, and who was now pastor in Decoria Township, south of Mankato, accepted a call to our congregation in the early summer of 1889. For fully twenty-five years, from 1889 to 1914, he discharged his duties here with faithfulness and energy.

During his years of ministry the congregation continued to grow on sound biblical basis. Under his direction the original church building was transformed into a religious day school. In 1892 the first parochial school teacher, H. Kilian, was called. In 1893 F. A. C. Remmert became the teacher and served in that capacity until 1903 and again from 1919 until 1929, when the Christian Day School was discontinued. During the years 1903 to 1919 Philip Scharmann was the teacher.

Pastor Appel terminated his services with the congregation in July 1914, accepting a call to St. Matthew's Ev. Lutheran Church in Duluth, Minnesota. He is still residing in that city, having retired from the active ministry in 1943 after having served the church of

Jesus Christ for fifty-eight years. He will be a welcome guest speaker at the Historical Day services of our Anniversary Week, October 10, the exact day of our seventy-fifth anniversary.

OUR PRESENT CHURCH



After many years the long cherished dream of the congregation was realized when this Gothic edifice was completed and dedicated to the service of the Triune God on June 1, 1924 on the ground which had been the church grounds from the time of St. Paul's first church building.

The year we had the Lay Witness Mission, Lisa was 4 years old. She had a black kitten that she loved and nurtured. We tried to prepare her for the inevitable that it was a fall "stubble" cat and would never live through the winter. We went to the prayer vigil and were sitting in one of the very front pews. Lisa got up, went up to the altar rail, knelt, folded her hands and prayed. She prayed for her kitten and it grew up to be a beautiful black cat.

Another fond memory are the many years of teaching 6th grade Sunday School and Bible School, using all of the helps in the Audio Visual Room. I taught one class of 12 students as 5th graders, taught the same 12 as 6th graders, and had the same 12 in Bible School. Brenda and Kieth Wendland were my helpers for Bible School that year. One morning the class was very "high spirited" and I screamed "Shut Up". Even Kieth and Brenda stopped in their tracks. will never forget Kieth's big brown eyes looking at me and you could have heard a pin drop. I went to Pastor Pilgrim later and told him I had lost my temper. "If this is any comfort", he told me, "that just shows you are human". Those years of teaching were the most rewarding of my life. My first class of students are now 40 years old. I enjoyed taking part in the Messiah, together with

I enjoyed taking part in the Messiah, together with members of all the churches in town. It was held in St. Paul when Pastor Hagen was here. We were to walk off the bleachers for intermission. We had stood so long our legs were like wood, and it was a struggle getting up the aisle.

My family's main language was low German, so this made learning very difficult. I belonged to the Men's Brotherhood. organization, which at one time had 60 members. There was a Bowling League. I remember team bowling with Garfield Bloedow, Ed Krueger, Herman Rogotzke, Sidney Schmidt, and Harold Wendt. I have 5 bowling trophies dating from 1963-1971. Remember black iron fence and big gate at the cemetery. The Brotherhood used to clean up the cemetery in the fall. Remember helping Harry Karow plant bushes at the cemetery. At that time cemetery lots sold for \$25.00. Those remaining from my 1918 confirmation class are Art Kieper, Elsie Peterson, and myself.

Tried super-gluing them so I could type the bulletin on Friday and I glued them crooked. It took me two hours extra to finish the bulletin after many mistakes.

MESSAGE- remember Sunday School in the big room; classes sat with teachers back to the wall and students in a semi-circle around them. Three teachers I remember are Hattie Meine. Lydia Jeske, and Arlene Bast. Remember having to be at church for confirmation by 7am. On Confirmation Sunday, walking down the center aisle and singing, "Take My Hand, Dear Father".

WILSTERMANN, Donald, Darlene

Don- transferred from Christ Lutheran, Wanda, MN, 1934 Darlene- transferred from Grace Lutheran, Westbrook, MN, 1964

MESSAGE- Don- I remember Rev. Max at Easter Sunrise Services when he would say, "He is Risen" with such conviction, it made you shiver with awe. All the memorizing for Saturday School and confirmation. Examination Sunday, scared stiff that you didn't want to make a mistake or forget anything. Three hour Christmas Eve programs, and when all the bow back chairs from the basement were carried upstairs and put in the aisle for extra seating. Black rubber runners with brass edging, in the aisles before carpeting. Tapestry of Peter and Jesus walking on water- it hung above the pulpit. Communion at the altar, 3 people at a time went up to receive bread on the west side of the altar, walked around back of the altar and received wine on the east side of the altar, and then back to the pew. Wire hat racks under the seat of the pews. Remember watching men put the water tank on the tower at the cemetery. It was made of wood. My dad hauling shrubbery for the landscaping of the cemetery from Rolls Nursery, on Lake Street, Minneapolis, MN. Work crews going to cemetery in the evening to straighten tombstones that were tipping. Buying and excavating land just north of the church for the parking lot. Short-sheeting Rev. Max's bed at Bible Camp at Onamia, MN., along with several other Luther Leaguers. Darlene- going to Maundy Thursday services a half hour early and no room left to sit but in the front pew. Two services on Sunday morning. I remember April, 1970, helping to take the "Lutheran Centennial Players" to Glencoe to present "A few Skits and Songs about things right and wrong with the world, the church, and you." The players were a group of young people from St. Paul and St. John's Lutheran churches, in a joint effort, performing in celebration of both churches observing their 100th Anniversaries.
